

Stella d'Oro Daylilies (*Hemerocallis* x 'Stella d'Oro')

Stella d'Oro daylilies are perennial flowers. The literal translation is "Star of Gold," and it is pronounced "Stella DOOR-oh." After dying back to the ground in the winter, these hardy plants will rebloom every year. Daylilies do not make good cut flowers, as the flowers do not last long. Leave them on the plant and enjoy them outdoors.



Plant Care: Like most flowering perennials, daylilies love full sun and are not as healthy in the shade. If the dead leaves and fronds in winter bother you, remove them, but this isn't necessary for the plant's growth. Flowering plants like daylilies also respond well to "dead-heading," that is, removing spent flowers regularly. This prevents the plants from using energy to try to produce seeds.

Watering: Water this plant regularly until it is established in the landscape. (Water when the soil surrounding the plant feels dry, but before the soil hardens.) After the first blooming season, these great accent plants are very hardy. Watering may only be necessary during drought conditions.
